WELCOME

Welcome to the Thirty-eighth New Jersey Synod Assembly. Please read this Bulletin of Reports so you may be an informed Voting Member.

Assembly Vocabulary No Accident

It is important to note and remember that no delegates will be present for the assembly. “Voting members” are not delegates!

- The terminology related to the legislative process of this church is no accident.
- The words “Synod Assembly,” rather than convention, and “Voting Members,” rather than delegates, were deliberately chosen for our governing documents.

These words not only fulfill certain legal requirements, but also reflect that the ecclesial understanding of the three primary expressions of this church—congregations, synod, and church-wide organization—exist and serve within this *one church*.

The people of this synod are not sent as delegates; they are *not* gathered to act as some politicized delegates to a regional party convention. Rather, they *assemble* as duly selected members of this church with *voting* responsibilities for governance and elections on behalf of the synod. The Synod Assembly is just that, an assembly of the people of this church, some of whom have been granted the responsibility of being *Voting Members* of the *Synod Assembly*.

The people of this church, when gathered as *Voting Members* of the Synod Assembly, have the responsibility of electing the voting members of the *Church-wide Assembly*. Persons so chosen are given the responsibility of doing the work of the Church-wide Assembly on behalf of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

They are *not* sent to participate as politicized delegates from some regional or agenda-specific caucus at some national party convention.

The vocabulary that we use both shapes and reflects our understanding of this church.

We need to (a) understand more clearly, and (b) embrace more completely the conviction that the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America “shall seek to function as people of God through congregations, synods, and the church-wide organization, all of which shall be interdependent. Each part, while fully the church, recognizes that it is not the whole church and, therefore, lives in a partnership relationship with the others.” (ELCA Church-wide Constitutional Provision 8.11.)

Indeed, we together affirm and declare the primary principle of organization of our church, namely: “The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America shall be one church.” (ELCA Church-wide Constitutional Provision 5.01)

Within this one church, we, as voting members, advisory members, non-voting members, visitors, and staff will gather to carry out the work of this Synod Assembly.

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"I am the vine; you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing" (John 15:5).

Dear siblings in Christ,

As you gather for your synod assembly, I want to express my gratitude for what you are doing — and have been doing — for this church, *our* church.

In the months since I was installed as presiding bishop, I have been focused on connection. Some of you have heard me talk about what it means to be a connected church. This vision of connectedness grows directly out of one of the three priorities we, as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, have named for this season of our life together.

When we lifted up these priorities, we committed ourselves to them not as abstract ideas but as guiding commitments for how we live and serve as church. As I reflected on them, the third priority stood out with particular clarity: to be a connected, sustainable church, raising the bar together.

That priority has been shaping my thinking and my leadership. It asks not just what we do but how we do it — together, across congregations, synods and the churchwide organization. Connectedness is not a program or a slogan; it is a way of being church that recognizes our shared calling and our shared responsibility. This is not my church. It is yours. It is ours, together. The ministries you carry out in your congregations and synods are not just yours — they are ours together.

Over the next several years, you will hear this priority expressed with greater focus and clarity. In 2026, our emphasis is on connection — strengthening relationships, listening deeply and recognizing how much we depend on one another.

In 2027, you will begin to hear me speak more intentionally about sustainability — how we steward our people, our resources and our structures so that our witness remains strong for generations to come. By 2028, connection and sustainability will come together in a shared language of togetherness, as we more fully live into who God is calling us to be as church.

So, when you hear language about being together, it is about living out the ELCA's vision of a world experiencing the difference God's grace and love in Christ make for all people and creation. It matters deeply to me that we know who we are, moving forward as one body, trusting God and one another.

I believe this is how connection is built — not by standing alone but by being church together.

Estimados hermanos en Cristo:

Ahora que van a reunirse en su asamblea sinodal, quiero expresar mi gratitud por lo que están y han estado haciendo por esta iglesia, *nuestra* iglesia.

En los meses desde que fui instalado como obispo presidente, me he concentrado en la conexión. Algunos de ustedes me han oído hablar sobre lo que significa ser una iglesia conectada. Esta visión de conexión surge directamente de una de las tres prioridades que nosotros, como la Iglesia Evangélica Luterana en América, hemos nombrado para este período de nuestra vida juntos.

Cuando destacamos estas prioridades, nos comprometimos con ellas, no como ideas abstractas, sino como compromisos que nos guían en cómo vivir y servir como iglesia. Al reflexionar sobre aquellas, la tercera prioridad sobresalió con una claridad particular: ser una iglesia conectada y sostenible, elevando el estándar todos juntos.

Esa prioridad ha estado moldeando mi pensamiento y mi liderazgo. No solo pregunta qué hacemos, sino cómo lo hacemos — juntos, en todas las congregaciones, los sínodos y la organización nacional. La conexión no es un programa ni un eslogan; es una forma de ser iglesia que reconoce nuestro llamado y responsabilidad compartidos. Esta no es mi iglesia. Es de ustedes. Es nuestra, juntos. Los ministerios que llevan a cabo en sus congregaciones y sínodos no son solo suyos —son nuestros juntos.


Durante los próximos años van a escuchar esta prioridad expresada con mayor enfoque y claridad. En 2026, nuestro énfasis está en la conexión: fortalecer las relaciones, escuchar profundamente y reconocer cuánto dependemos unos de otros.

En 2027 comenzarán a oírme hablar con más intención sobre la sostenibilidad: cómo cuidamos a nuestra gente, nuestros recursos y nuestras estructuras para que nuestro testimonio siga siendo fuerte para las generaciones venideras. 1. **ON-SITE CHECK-IN:** Begins at 8:45am. **PROMPT** registration check in is requested as a quorum is needed to open the Assembly.

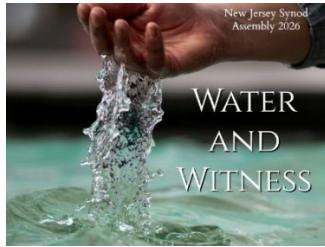
2. **WORSHIP:** Worship will begin at 9:30 AM. All are welcome!

NEW JERSEY SYNOD, ELCA
RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE 38th SYNOD ASSEMBLY

1. One third of the voting members of the synod assembly shall constitute a quorum. (S7.14)
2. Two (2) lay representatives of Synodically Authorized Worshiping Communities and Synod Approved Outreach Mission of the New Jersey Synod shall be given voice and vote during the Assembly.
3. Persons who are on the roster of the New Jersey Synod, ELCA, On Leave or Retired, Living Out-of-State, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations/worshiping communities by special appointment, and those Retired Pastors Living Out-of-State who are actively engaged in the life and ministry of the New Jersey Synod shall be given voice and vote during the Assembly.
4. Persons on the roster of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) in a Synod other than the New Jersey Synod, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations by special appointment, shall be given voice and vote, during the Assembly.
5. Persons who are not on the roster of the ELCA, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations/worshiping communities by special appointment of the Bishop of the NJ Synod shall be given voice and vote, during the Assembly.
6. Chairs of Mission Teams and Committees listed by the Synod Council shall be given voice, not vote, on matters pertaining to their work during the Assembly.
7. Voting will take place in a variety of ways throughout the assembly. These may include electronic voting using Vpoll, voice votes, and voting cards. To have an abstention recorded, notify the secretary. Abstentions do not count in the vote totals.
8. Voting members need a smartphone or tablet in order to use Vpoll for voting. Unique login credentials will be provided upon registration. There is no provision for proxy voting.
9. When an item of business is opened by the chair for discussion, those voting members wishing to speak must move to a floor microphone. Before speaking, each person will indicate their name, congregation name and location. Members must specify if they are speaking for or against the item under consideration.
10. Debate shall be limited to two minutes per person per issue. Time will be kept by the Secretary. Debate will terminate when three speakers have been heard on each side, unless otherwise determined by a majority vote of the voting members present and voting.
11. Late Resolutions received after the March 31 deadline will be referred to the NJ Synod Council.
12. Resolutions received on time shall be reviewed by the Committee of Reference and Counsel, which, when reporting to the Assembly, may:
 1. recommend approval;
 2. recommend disapproval;
 3. recommend referral to the Synod Council; or
 4. recommend a substitute motion to the Assembly

13. Floor nominations for at-large positions may be made at the time of the Nominating Committee report and require completion of the [electronic nomination form](#).
14. All reports published in the Bulletin of Reports shall be received by the Assembly by virtue of that fact without vote.

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR ADOPTION OF THE 2027 SPENDING PLAN

1. At the time of the introduction of the Spending Plan, discussion shall be limited to questions for clarification and information and the serving of notices of intent to move an amendment to the Spending Plan.
2. Voting Members desiring to present motions germane to the Spending Plan shall be given until **12:00 noon on Saturday, May 30** to submit written notice of such intent to the Treasurer, James Harris.
3. Members of the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall meet with voting members proposing an amendment.
4. At the time appointed for the adoption of the Spending Plan, the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall report to the Assembly all proposed amendments, with the Committee's recommendations.
5. When motions germane to the Spending Plan are presented on the floor of the Assembly, the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall have an opportunity to respond to the recommendations. Any Voting Member wishing to increase a line item in any area of the Spending Plan shall propose a source of funding.

RESOLUTION I
NEW JERSEY SYNOD, ELCA

A RESOLUTION TO ENCOURAGE CONGREGATIONAL EDUCATION AND ACTION TO OPPOSE THE INFLUENCE OF CHRISTIAN NATIONALISM IN FAITH AND POLITICS.

WHEREAS the political ideology of Christian Nationalism idealizes and advocates a fusion of Christianity with American civic life, appropriating sacred symbols, interpretation of history, values, and policies, insisting that they have always and must continue to reflect a narrow interpretation of Christian teachings,¹ and

WHEREAS Christian Nationalism seeks to place political power only in the hands of Christian Nationalists, at the expense of foreigners, immigrants, and even native-born Americans who are not believed to belong on racial and religious grounds,² and

WHEREAS approximately three in ten Americans are sympathetic to the worldview and agenda of Christian Nationalism,³ and

WHEREAS although many expressions of Christian Nationalism are not overtly violent, Christian Nationalism in its most extreme form is closely associated with violent hate groups,⁴ and

WHEREAS the Constitution of the United States is not a religious charter, but rather establishes a secular system that favors no group among religions,⁵ and

WHEREAS the gospel of Jesus Christ does not call for the massing of governmental power in His name, but rather calls those who faithfully follow Christ to love neighbors, welcome foreigners and strangers among us, care for the needy and powerless, free those oppressed by systems of inequity, and treat all with justice and mercy,⁶ and

WHEREAS the association of this nationalist ideology with the language and symbols of Christianity places the responsibility firmly on Christ's church to publicly reject this ideology as heresy and to work to oppose its influence in both the church and the public square.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that all congregations of the New Jersey Synod are encouraged to provide educational opportunities exploring the theological errors and the political dangers contained within the Christian Nationalism movement.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all congregations of the New Jersey Synod are encouraged to seek to advocate at the local level (school boards and town council deliberations) to protect the witness of the gospel by maintaining separation of church and state in local policies and by opposing implementation of Christian Nationalist policy goals.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Anti-Racism Team of the New Jersey Synod shall provide educational resources and be available to assist congregations in their educational and advocacy efforts.

UNA RESOLUCIÓN PARA FOMENTAR LA EDUCACIÓN DE LAS CONGREGACIONES Y LA ACCIÓN PARA Oponerse A LA INFLUENCIA DEL NACIONALISMO CRISTIANO EN LA FE Y LA POLÍTICA.

CONSIDERANDO que aproximadamente tres de cada diez estadounidenses son simpatizantes de la cosmovisión y la agenda del Nacionalismo Cristiano; y

CONSIDERANDO que, aunque muchas expresiones del Nacionalismo Cristiano no son abiertamente violentas, en su forma más extrema está estrechamente asociado con grupos de odio violentos; y

CONSIDERANDO que la Constitución de los Estados Unidos no es una carta religiosa, sino que establece un sistema secular que no favorece a ningún grupo entre las religiones; y

CONSIDERANDO que el evangelio de Jesucristo no llama a la acumulación de poder gubernamental en Su nombre, sino que llama a aquellos que fielmente siguen a Cristo a amar al prójimo, dar la bienvenida a los extranjeros entre nosotros, cuidar a los necesitados y desamparados, liberar a los oprimidos por sistemas de inequidad, y tratar a todos con justicia y misericordia; y

CONSIDERANDO que la asociación de esta ideología nacionalista con el lenguaje y los símbolos del cristianismo coloca la responsabilidad firmemente en la iglesia de Cristo para rechazar públicamente esta ideología como herejía y trabajar para oponerse a su influencia tanto en la iglesia como en la esfera pública.

AHORA, POR LO TANTO, SE RESUELVE que se aliente a todas las congregaciones del Sínodo de Nueva Jersey a ofrecer oportunidades educativas que exploren los errores teológicos y los peligros políticos contenidos dentro del movimiento del Nacionalismo Cristiano.

Y SE RESUELVE ADEMÁS que se aliente a todas las congregaciones del Sínodo de Nueva

Jersey a buscar abogar a nivel local (juntas escolares y deliberaciones de consejos municipales) para proteger el testimonio del evangelio mediante el mantenimiento de la separación de la iglesia y el estado en las políticas locales y al oponerse a la implementación de los objetivos de políticas del Nacionalismo Cristiano.

Y SE RESUELVE ADEMÁS que el Equipo Antirracismo del Sínodo de Nueva Jersey proporcione recursos educativos y esté disponible para asistir a las congregaciones en sus esfuerzos educativos y de defensa.

WHEREAS the rapid adoption of Artificial Intelligence brings up perplexing questions within congregations, seminaries, and the pulpit, and

WHEREAS AI is often described as set to have the same level of impact on the world as the Industrial Revolution, the invention of the internet or the printing press, or even the discovery of fire, and

WHEREAS AI promoters promise that it will be a tool that sorts through the near infinite amount of information produced in our world, creates more efficient offices and electrical grids, and widens access to healthcare and education, and

WHEREAS AI skeptics warn that it will leave large percentages of young people unemployed, cause irreparably damage to the environment, create unintended cultural chaos, give cover for illegal activities, and make decisions without responsibility and have authority without accountability, and

WHEREAS this Church has wise things to say about truth, vocation, personhood, and idolatry, be it

RESOLVED that the New Jersey Synod memorializes the 2028 Churchwide Assembly to authorize the creation of a Social Message on AI to be produced at or before the Churchwide Assembly in 2031.

Mission Support is the congregational gifts to support the work of our synod. Mission Support provided 85% of the spending plan income in 2025 and is forecast to provide 68% of income in 2027.

Restricted Fund draws are the money released from restricted funds to support synod programs. This money supports congregations and missions within New Jersey, the United Lutheran seminary, pastoral candidates, Cross Roads Camp, programs supporting church pastors, stewardship programming, the Bishop's Office, and management of the synod properties. The approval of this spending plan explicitly approves spending this money from these restricted funds.

Other Income includes personal gifts to the synod, Thrivent Choice dollars and interest income.

NECROLOGY REPORT

Since our last Synod Assembly, the following beloved saints of this Synod have entered the Church Triumphant.

THE REV. THOMAS EDWARD DORSEY

June 6, 1940 – May 5, 2025

Ordained: September 29, 2002

Pastor: Trinity, Fairview

Retired: September 19, 2022

The Rev. Dr. Thomas Edward Dorsey entered ordained ministry at the age of 62 following a long and distinguished career as a scientist in the pharmaceutical industry. He served 20 years as pastor of Trinity, Fairview, from September 2002 until his retirement in October 2022. While he was a New Yorker through and through – born and raised in the faith in New York City, educated in NY, receiving an MS from Queens College, a PhD from the City University of NY, and an MDiv from Union Theological Seminary, and serving a career of almost 30 years in the city – nevertheless, when God called him to serve in NJ, he served faithfully and well in the NJ Synod.



Tom was encouraged by his candidacy committee to find ways to combine his science background with his calling as pastor. And he did, in his teaching and preaching. He was proud to add his voice to the conversations in the ELCA about the blessing of same sex marriages and the full participation of partnered LGBTQ+ pastors which led to the adoption of the 2009 social statement on human sexuality. Tom was an outspoken proponent of congregations becoming Reconciling in Christ so that all people would know they are loved and welcomed in the church.

During his 20 years at Trinity, Tom served as vice pastor at more than 5 neighboring congregations when the need arose. He also served on the synod's investment committee and on the board of trustees of Lutheran Social Ministries, NJ.

Pastor Steinman, born in Buffalo, NY, was a graduate of Medaille College in Buffalo, with a B.S. in Elementary Education. Before entering seminary, he was a teacher at the Longview School in NY. As a student at Trinity Seminary, Columbus, OH, Randy spent junior year as vicar at St. Peter Lutheran Church, Baltimore, MD, and earned an M. Div. from Trinity in 1983.

The congregation of Redeemer, Neptune, called Randy as their pastor and he was ordained a minister of Word and Sacrament on July 9, 1983 at St. Peter in Baltimore. Randy served his entire ministry of more than forty years at Redeemer.

In addition to parish ministry at Redeemer, Randy served as an early member of the NJ Synod LGBTQ+ Task Group, the Evangelism Resource Team Committee and was a founding partner of The Center, a support system for persons living with HIV, in Asbury Park.

Along with the congregation of Redeemer, he is survived by his sister Cindy Smith, two nephews Nathan and Mark, and one niece Natalie.

Report of the Treasurer to the 2026 New Jersey Synod Assembly

This report summarizes the New Jersey Synod financial results for 2025. Details are available in the **2025 Financial Statements and Independent Auditor’s Report** and the **Proposed 2027 Spending Plan**.

The New Jersey Synod is 143 congregations that share the ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the state of New Jersey. Synod programs and staff are supported primarily through monetary gifts from the synod congregations. The synod staff supports the work of Lutheran congregations and missions across New Jersey. All of us together are the New Jersey Synod.

The 2025 Spending Plan was approved at our 2024 Synod Assembly. The spending plan supported:

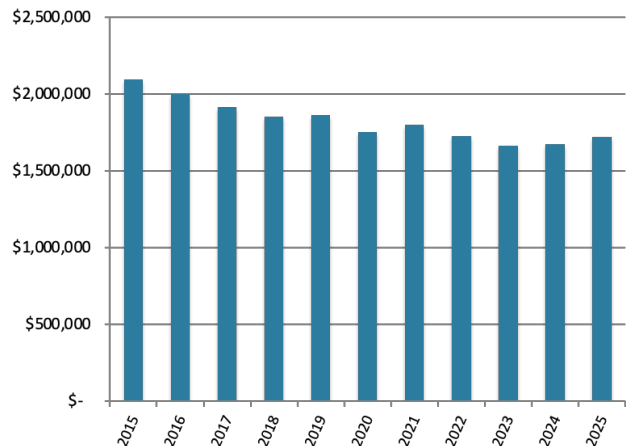
- Our synod, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in New Jersey
- Our ministry partners, particularly Cross Roads Camp and the United Lutheran Seminary
- Congregations and mission groups within our synod
- Candidacy, pastoral vacancy, congregational call and other synodical processes
- Youth Ministry, Continuing Education and synod action teams
- ELCA Churchwide ministries

Total 2025 spending plan revenues were \$2.03 million including \$1.72 million in Mission Support. Expenses were \$2.03 million. We ended the year with a balanced budget.

Mission Support

Mission Support provided 85% of the money for running synod programs and office. 2025 giving totaled \$1.72 million, a \$47 thousand increase compared to the previous year. It was a \$373 thousand decrease compared to 2015, 10 years ago.

50% of Mission Support received by the synod is sent directly to ELCA Churchwide.



Restricted Funds

In addition to the spending plan, the synod administers money designated for specific purposes such as the Fund for Mission, the Wurffel Fund, the Candidacy Endowment, the Brueckner Outdoor Ministry fund and the Our Savior Edison endowment. Each fund has a defined purpose that restricts how the money can be spent.

The money associated with these restricted funds was invested and managed by a volunteer committee that reports to the Synod Council. All fund disbursements were approved by the Synod Council and reviewed by our outside auditors. From restricted funds, the synod spent \$1.38 million during 2025.

Total restricted funds totaled \$19.82 million at the end of fiscal year 2025 compared to \$17.88 million at the beginning of the year. This 1.94 million increase was investment income, donations into the funds, and sale proceeds from Trinity Lutheran in Fairview (yet to be disbursed) minus funds spending.

The synod office also received designated gifts for World Hunger and other mission causes. During the year we received and forwarded on \$149 thousand in restricted gifts to ELCA World Hunger and other ELCA programs.

Balance Sheet

The balance sheet summarizes the synod's financial condition. At the end of fiscal year 2025:

- Total Assets were \$23.40 million compared to \$22.87 at the end of the previous year.
- Fixed Assets totaled \$3.23 million.
- Total Liabilities were \$96 thousand. Of this, \$90 thousand was related to legal defense in active lawsuits.

The synod balance sheet demonstrates that the NJ Synod was financially healthy.

Financial Audit

The synod retained Tait Weller & Baker, LLP certified public accountants to examine our 2025 financial transactions and to create our annual financial reports. At the conclusion of their examination the auditors expressed the opinion that the Synod's financial statements were complete and accurate. The synod Audit Committee planned the audit calendar with the goal of providing the final audit report to this Synod Assembly.

Governance Committees

who gave generously of their time and talents to oversee the administration of Synod financial assets, resources, and properties. These committees were a key part in enabling the New Jersey Synod to advance the goals and mission of our Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Thanks to Lois Parrett who, along with other many other duties, conscientiously and faithfully executed financial processes, reconciled accounts and maintained records for our synod. The synod staff and programs would be unable to function without her dedicated efforts.

Living Generously Together

Generosity and interdependence are two of our Synod’s six core values. We live out our faith in many ways – including how we offer, “...ourselves, our time and our possessions... (ELW, *Offertory Prayer*, p.107).” These acts are not only inherent to God’s grace, but they also become a blessed, powerful, and tangible witness in the world.

This is a Synod that confesses that all we know and believe is rooted in God’s merciful action in and through Jesus Christ. It also means that we are invited into that same life, and what it means to give. Thank you, NJ Synod congregations and leaders, for your commitment and your witness!

Stewardship as a Way of Life

As we continue to navigate our way into God’s future, we are learning that stewardship is more than a program or pledge card – it’s a season of spiritual renewal and a way of life. It invites us to:

- Pray, plan, and inspire one another
- Encourage one another to live out of God’s abundance
- See Christ in our neighbors –and allow them to see Christ in us.

To support this, your NJ Synod encourages the following practices (a non-exhaustive list):

- **Annual Appeals:** Plan and carry out yearly appeals that not only grow financial giving, but also celebrate God’s ministry across the congregation, Synod, and wider Church.
- **Year-Round Communication:** Share stories of generosity and service through announcements, sermon illustrations and social media to show how giving makes a difference in the community.
- **Planned Giving:** Collaborate with partners like the ELCA Foundation to explore planned giving and equip congregational leadership to knowledgeably invite members and friends to make gifts through appreciated assets or other donor-specific beneficial means.
- **Electronic Giving:** Use digital platforms to make financial offerings more accessible.
- **Property Stewardship:** Consider creative, faithful ways to use church property to support mission and ministry. *For example*, in September 2024, the Excellence in Ministry Unleashed (EMU) team hosted the ‘Funding Forward’ workshop, led by Grace Duddy Pomroy of Luther Seminary’s Stewardship Leaders Program. In 2025, the ELCA added the ‘Church Property Resource Hub’ as an information resource on its webpage (<https://www.elca.org/how-we-serve/churches-and-church-leaders/property-resources>).

Highlights of Generosity in the NJ Synod (2025)

- **Together** we exceeded mission support offering intentions by over \$1,000!
- **Mission Support Intentions** - 135 of 145 congregations/strategic ministries submitted mission support intentions. That’s a 93% response rate – exceptional!

- **Mission Support Participation** - 136 congregations contributed mission support, representing 95% participation – outstanding!
- **Congregations Exceeding Intentions** – 109 of our 143 congregations met or exceeded their mission support intention! 34 congregations (24%) exceeded their original mission support goals – absolutely marvelous!
- **Looking Ahead to 2026** – 138 out of 143 congregations and 3 ‘new start’ ministries have already shared their 2025 mission support intentions totaling \$1,708,100. This positions our Synod strongly to carry out the ministry initiatives affirmed at our last assembly for this year. Half of this (50%) is shared with the ELCA as Mission Support!
- **Generosity Training and Resources:**
 - Courses such as *Cultivating Generous Congregations* (Lake Institute on Faith & Giving) and *Building a Culture of Generosity* (GSB Consulting) are available to interested congregations.
 - The NJ Synod offers financial assistance to help cover the cost of these valuable programs.

Report of the Director for Evangelical Mission (DEM)

“Were not our hearts burning within us while he was talking to us on the road, while he was opening the scriptures to us?” (Luke 24:32–33, 35, NRSV)

Water marks us. Witness moves us.

The story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus offers a window into the heart of God’s mission among us. Two followers walk together—confused and discouraged—when the risen Christ meets them as a fellow traveler. He draws near. He listens. He opens the Scriptures. Their hearts begin to burn. And when they recognize him in the breaking of the bread, they cannot remain still; they rise at once and return to Jerusalem to bear witness.

This holy movement—*marked by grace and moved into witness*—captures the heart of evangelical mission in the New Jersey Synod. We trust in a God who draws near, walks alongside congregations and leaders, dwells with us in Scripture and prayer, and ignites hearts through the Holy Spirit for faithful witness and bold movement into God’s future.

Marked by Water: Remembering Who We Are

In baptism, we are claimed by Christ before we are ever sent into the world. Across the synod, congregations and ministries are returning again and again to this foundational truth: God’s mission begins not with what we do, but with what God has already done.

Our work has centered on walking alongside congregations and leaders in their particular contexts, listening deeply for where Christ is already present and at work. Whether through mission starts, strategic ministries, congregations in transition, learning communities, or justice initiatives, a consistent guiding question remains: *Where are hearts beginning to burn, and how might we help communities name and share that fire?*

Through relationships with mission developers, strategic ministers, and congregational leaders, we have supported ministries serving immigrant communities, multiethnic and intersectional contexts, historically marginalized neighbors, and congregations navigating fragility and change. Relationships—marked by trust, prayer, and shared discernment—have been our primary strategy, rooted in the conviction that God’s mission unfolds through presence and partnership.

Ministries such as Santa Isabel Ministry with Immigrants in Detention at the Elizabeth Detention Center, Casa Unida Luterana in Pennsauken, Camino de Vida in Summit, and Tapestry Collective in Montclair embody baptismal identity through daily practices of welcome, dignity, and neighboring love. These communities bear witness that God meets people in places of confinement and transition, weaving together diverse stories, cultures, and gifts. The waters of baptism flow outward into lived relationships of trust, hospitality, and hope among immigrants, day laborers, unhoused neighbors, and LGBTQIA+ individuals.

Formed Along the Road: Learning Communities That Shape Witness

Like the disciples on the road to Emmaus, leaders across the synod have gathered in learning communities rooted in Scripture, spiritual practice, and shared discernment. These spaces invite leaders to slow down, pause, listen, learn, and try faithful experiments as a way of responding to where God might be leading them.

Cohorts such as *Caminando Unidos en Cristo*, *Go And...*, *The Multiethnic and Intersectional Ministries*, and *The Saints Go* offer formation that is relational, contextual, and grounded in lived faith. In these communities, leaders grow in confidence to speak about Jesus, engage neighbors with curiosity and compassion, and lead from trust in the Spirit's movement rather than fear.

As on the Emmaus Road, Christ is often revealed not in certainty but in conversation, not in polished answers but in shared stories and broken bread. By making room for hearts to burn again, these cohorts renew joy, courage, and engage in experimentations and new awareness of God's invitation.

Moved into Witness: Sent for the Sake of the World

When the disciples recognize Jesus, they do not linger. As witnesses, they are sent back into the world at once—on the road again, returning to Jerusalem.

That same movement is unfolding across the New Jersey Synod through Strategic Ministries such as Abiding Love-Kendall Park, Bridge of Peace-Camden, Christus-Camden, Emanuel-New Brunswick, Santa Isabel-Elizabeth, St. Bartholomew-Trenton, St. John-Passaic, St. Stephan Grace-Newark, and Trinity-Jersey City. These ministries embody the gospel love in concrete ways—especially among communities navigating uncertainty.

Through immigrant accompaniment, feeding ministries, language classes, and culturally responsive leadership, these communities reflect the gospel's call to welcome the stranger and proclaim hope amid fear or brokenness. Encountering Jesus leads to mission—lived through compassion, presence, creativity, innovation, and faithful witness.

Gratitude and Hope

I give thanks to God for your ongoing gospel witness and for the ways God is at work in your congregations and communities. I am grateful for Bishop Compton, the synod staff, and the many partners God has gathered on this journey—from mission leaders and working groups across the New Jersey Synod to our churchwide partners, especially the ELCA New Ministry Development and Evangelism Team.

Above all, we give thanks for the risen Christ who still meets us on the road—opening the Scriptures, kindling hope, and sending the church out again. Like the disciples, may we continue to recognize Christ among us and rise to share what we have seen.

2026 Report of the New Jersey Synod Archivist / Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia



Greetings from the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia (LACAP)! LACAP is the northeastern regional archives center for the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The synods of region seven of the ELCA include Northeastern Pennsylvania, Southeastern Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Metropolitan New York, Upstate New York, New England, and the non-geographical Slovak Zion Synod. The roots of the work of LACAP date back to 1792, when the archives of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania were collected and officially recognized as an arm of the work of the Ministerium. The Ministerium of PA archives were housed and maintained at the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now ULS) starting in 1889. LACAP was incorporated in 1979 within the former Lutheran Church in America, and was a joint venture between the synods of the region and the seminary.

The materials housed at LACAP include the Ministerium of PA collection (with the original colonial journals of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg), archival records of closed congregations from within the region, as well as historical records from some living congregations. In addition, we house records from Lutheran agencies and ministries, and even some significant ecumenical records from the Lutheran/Catholic dialogue. LACAP publishes the *Archives Advocate*. Digital copies of this fine publication are available online at our website, <https://www.lutheranarchives.org/home>. On our website you will find a great number of other resources, including finding guides for all of our materials, and digital copies of some of our significant historical documents. LACAP is part of the “Revolutionary City” project, which is a digital portal offering examples of significant documents for the celebration of the 250th anniversary of the United States. Please keep the work of our regional archives in your prayers, and we hope that you may pay a visit!

Along with other Synod Archivists (and with eight Directors at Large), I serve on the Board of LACAP. In addition, I have served as president of the LACAP board since 2011. Synod Archivists collect materials from closed congregations, and act as resource persons for congregations and individuals looking for information from closed (and occasionally, living) congregations. Personally, I have assisted a number of individuals this past year who have needed baptismal and marriage records for a variety of reasons (from those seeking “real ID” cards, to providing proof of birth for Social Security benefits, and, several years ago, we even had a case where an individual living abroad needed proof of baptism in order to inherit a hereditary title!).

This year we rejoice with six New Jersey Synod congregations that are celebrating significant anniversaries. As we have done for many years now, we will have a video celebration of the NJ Synod congregations celebrating anniversaries this year during our Assembly. I invite the congregations of the New Jersey Synod gathered in Assembly to give thanks to the Triune God for the anniversaries of the following congregations that are celebrating significant anniversaries:

Mission Advocacy Table Report

The Mission Advocacy Table accompanies congregations as they participate in God's mission across the New Jersey Synod and beyond. In 2026, this work continues through supporting new mission starts, accompanying strategic ministries, and cultivating Christ-centered learning communities that equip leaders and congregations for faithful witness.

New Mission Starts

Our work with new mission starts centers on resourcing, leadership development, and supporting congregations as they grow as faithful mission outposts. In 2026, the **Synod Authorized Worshiping Communities (SAWCs)** include:

- Santa Isabel Ministry with Immigrants in Detention, serving individuals held at the Elizabeth Detention Center, led by Pastor Ramón Collazo, Mission Developer.
- Casa Unida Luterana, a Spanish-language parallel mission start with Temple Lutheran Church in Pennsauken, led by Vicar Jason Reed, Mission Developer, and Carmen Acevedo, Lay Evangelist.

The **Synod Authorized Outreach Ministries (SAOMs)** currently include:

- Camino de Vida, housed at St. John's Lutheran Church in Summit and led by Pastor Haydée Colón-Hernández, Mission Developer
- The Tapestry Collective, housed at First Lutheran Church in Montclair and led by Pastor Margarette Oujj, Mission Developer.

Strategic Ministries

The Mission Advocacy Table also accompanies and oversees Strategic Ministries, providing accompaniment, resources, and leadership development for contextually responsive ministries that engage communities beyond traditional congregational models in bearing Christ's love. In 2026, these ministries include: Abiding Love (Kendall Park); Bridge of Peace (Camden); Christus (Camden); Emanuel (New Brunswick); Santa Isabel (Elizabeth); St. Bartholomew (Trenton); St. John (Passaic); St. Stephen's Grace (Newark); and Trinity (Jersey City).

Learning Communities

Grounded in accompaniment and shared discernment, the Mission Advocacy Table nurtures spaces where leaders and congregations are formed and transformed for the sake of the world. These learning communities gather leaders in cohorts that support congregational vitality through theological reflection, leadership formation, and shared spiritual practices, renewing the church for faithful engagement in God's mission amid changing contexts. Supported in part through the Cultivating Congregational Vitality Grant, these opportunities include:

- **Caminando Unidos en Cristo**, an online Spanish-language lay leadership

formation community for faithful witness

- **The Saints Go**, a collaborative cohort connecting Abiding Presence (Ewing), Bethany-Trinity (Jersey City), Calvary (Cranford), Grace (Mendham), and St. Matthew (Jersey City) for grow in faith, spiritual practices, and leadership development for participation in God’s mission
- **Go And...**, provides gathering spaces for relational evangelism and outreach
- **Coaching opportunities** provided through ELCA Coaches

Together, these ministries bear witness to our synod’s shared commitment to nurturing Christ-centered communities rooted in their contexts and engaged in God’s mission for the sake of the world.

We give thanks to God for our mission developers, strategic ministers, and the facilitators and coaches who equip and encourage congregational vitality and leadership formation across the New Jersey Synod.

ELCA Gathering Expedition – September 26-28, 2025

The ELCA Gathering Expedition was a regional retreat at Cross Roads designed to connect youth and adult leaders through the theme of "Faith in Motion." It served as a local bridge to the national ELCA Youth Gathering, offering a weekend of worship, small-group reflection, and leadership development. The event focused on building community and reigniting a passion for ministry within the New Jersey region.

Gotham FC Soccer Game – October 19, 2025

Our outing to a Gotham FC women's professional soccer game was an absolute blast, with 40 participants gathering at Sports Illustrated Stadium to cheer on the team! The day featured a pre-game tailgate and discounted tickets provided by the YMMT, topped off with an exclusive group photo on the field after the match.

Service Project at the Farminary – November 1, 2025

Our service project at the Farminary was an incredible experience, with 19 high school and adult participants gathering at Princeton Theological Seminary's 21-acre farm to explore the intersection of faith, food justice, and sustainable agriculture. It was a meaningful day of service and fellowship that allowed our youth to "dig deep" into theology and community.

Synod Youth Retreat – November 21-23, 2025

The Synod Youth Retreat was held at Cross Roads, welcoming 100 participants, including youth in grades 6–12 and their adult leaders, for a weekend of worship, study, and fellowship under the theme "Embrace." We are incredibly grateful to everyone who helped plan this event and to all the participants who joined us to make this first year at camp so memorable.

Faith, Hope, and Love – April 25, 2026

This year, we were excited to bring back Faith, Hope, and Love, an intergenerational event hosted in partnership with the New Jersey Synod and the YMMT. The day invited people of all ages to explore how faith calls us to respond to marginalization with active hope and compassion. Through plenary sessions and small group conversations, participants engaged deeply with critical topics including immigration, LGBTQIA+ inclusion, and racial justice.

Cross Roads Youth Ministry Partnership

The YMMT continued its close partnership with Cross Roads through several key events this year. We moved our annual Synod Youth Retreat to camp—a huge hit with our participants—and collaborated on the Shepherd's Gathering, the Rally for Cross Roads, and various age-specific retreats. Looking to enhance your congregation's communication?

Here are some of the tools we recommend you use for your own ministry. If there is another service you are having great success with, please let us know!

- 1) You are creating content every week. Share it via a weekly email newsletter using MailChimp (<https://mailchimp.com/>). If people on your email list are opening your email anywhere in the 40%-50% range, you're doing great.
- 2) Looking to create graphics for social media? Think about using Canva (<https://www.canva.com>). Canva provides free pro-accounts to non-profits (including churches!) To get a pro-account for your church, you will need your tax status documentation. You can get that by sending an email to 501c3@elca.org with your church's legal name, full street address and 9-digit Federal Employer Identification Number (EIN). The ELCA's office of the Secretary will send you back 3 pdfs. Combine those pdfs into 1 file and use that document to apply for a Canva pro account at <https://support.canva.com/account-basics/nonprofit-program/apply-for-nonprofit/>.
- 3) Make sure to reach out to your local community newspapers. Regularly send them photos and press releases about what's happening at your church three weeks in advance.
- 4) Use the sign on your building and regularly update your message.
- 5) Create a robust permission form to let children be in your photos. Ask permission and let folks opt in or opt out.
- 6) Think through how people are communicating with you. Your weekly email newsletter will be viewed on a smartphone so focus on upcoming events and bite-sized ways to build someone's faith. Your monthly printed newsletter should contain long-term plans and longer faith formation materials. Social media posts should encourage engagement in ways specific to your community (i.e. making worship last throughout the week, enhancing your prayer ministry, food pantry, why Jesus, etc).

- 7) Be mindful not everyone is online. You can use Zoom to create a conference call so people can listen to your worship each Sunday. Mail a bulletin and sermon to someone at home, they are worshiping with their entire faith community!
- 8) Shortform video content is important. Instagram, Facebook, Youtube, and TikTok are driving the conversation across all ages. Short videos can showcase the content you're already doing. Clip part of the sermon, a selection from the choir, and a prayer you share you're already showing on livestream. Partner with folks within the congregation to create 60 second videos that are funny or faithful or descriptive of what you're doing. A short video about why you run a food pantry, knit prayer shawls, make hygiene kits, visit those in prison, or why different groups are in your building can make a big impact. Don't worry about going viral. Do your part to share the story of why we get to do what we do (i.e. Jesus, grace, and faith).
- 9) Social Media algorithms are constantly changing as the big businesses behind them reinforce whatever their corporate and political goals happen to be that week. Don't chase the algorithm. Instead always be faithfully authentically yourselves. Feel free to embrace the block and delete button for comments that are harmful. Shake the dust off your feet and move on.
- 10) All your communication should sound like you. Don't chase trends or trust AI as a magical fix. Make sure all your communications (livestream, TikTok, Instagram, website, emails, and branding) sound like you. COMPENSATION AID TASK FORCE REPORT FOR 2025

Since its establishment at the 1994 Synod Assembly, the Compensation Aid Task Force has received \$1,622,103.05 from legacy gifts, congregations, and individuals of the NJ Synod. In addition, there was \$47,046.73 of net investment gains for the year.

2025 Receipts: A total of \$5,712.96 was received. This includes contributions from one pastor and 8 congregations.

2025 Disbursements: \$29,583.25 in grant money was given to three congregations.

2025 Balance: \$549,529.40

This fund was established to supplement the compensation of pastors receiving a salary of 20% or more below Synod guidelines and assist retired pastors whose pension income is inadequate. Over the years, it has also been used to help first-call pastors reduce student loan debt.

Along with processing applications for grants and consulting with congregations that apply, the Task Force encourages congregations to contribute to the Compensation Aid Fund an amount equal to 1% of their pastor's "Defined Compensation" as determined by the ELCA's pension and health plan. Eligible congregations and pastors are invited to contact the office of the Bishop or Pastor James Egan for more information. Thanks to Lois Parrett, Synod bookkeeper, for assisting the Task Force by recording receipts and disbursements.

Thanks to the congregations of the Synod and individuals who have contributed over the years and to congregations that have directed a legacy gift to the fund. Your generous sharing has made it possible to lessen the financial stress of those in the ordained ministry.

Section 1: Amendments to Required Provisions

Chapter 6. STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

†S6.04.02. It is the goal of this synod that at least 10 percent of the voting members of the Synod Assembly, Synod Council, committees, and organizational units of this synod be members of historically underrepresented groups, in addition to the 10 percent representation of persons of color and/or persons whose primary language is other than English in †S6.04. The Synod Council shall establish a plan for implementing this goal.

Chapter 7. SYNOD ASSEMBLY

†S7.21. The membership of the Synod Assembly, of which at least 60 percent of the voting membership shall be composed of laypersons, shall be constituted as follows:

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- b. Lay voting members shall be elected by each congregation or its council as follows: A minimum of one lay member elected ~~by~~ ~~from~~ each congregation with fewer than 175 baptized members and a minimum of two lay members elected ~~by~~ ~~from~~ each congregation with 175 or more baptized members ~~related to this synod~~, typically one of whom shall be a man and one of whom shall be a woman, ~~shall be voting members~~. The Synod Council shall establish a formula to provide additional lay representation from congregations on the basis of the number of baptized members in the congregation. The Synod Council shall seek to ensure that, as nearly as possible, at least 45 percent of the lay members of the assembly shall be women and, as nearly as possible, at least 45 percent shall be men.

†S7.21.02. If a special Synod Assembly is called and voting members at the previous assembly are unable to serve as voting members, where permitted by state law, the congregation ~~through the Congregation Council~~ or its council may elect new members who shall continue to serve until the next regular Synod Assembly.

†S7.25. Except as otherwise provided in this constitution or in the *Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America*, each voting member of the Synod Assembly shall be a voting member of a congregation or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community of this synod.

Chapter 8. OFFICERS

†S8.21. The vice president shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. The vice president shall be a layperson. The vice president shall be a voting member of a congregation or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community of this synod. The vice president shall not receive a salary for the performance of the duties of the office.

†S8.31. The secretary shall be elected by the Synod Assembly. The secretary shall be a voting member of a congregation or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community of this synod. The secretary may be either a layperson or a rostered minister.

†S8.41. The treasurer may be elected by the Synod Assembly or may be appointed by the Synod Council. The treasurer shall be a voting member of a congregation or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community of this synod. The treasurer may be either a layperson or a rostered minister.

- †S8.51. The terms of office of the officers of this synod shall be as follows:
-
- c. The treasurer of this synod shall be [elected] [appointed] **[elected or appointed]** to a term of _____ years and may be [re-elected] [reappointed] **[re-elected or reappointed]**. The treasurer shall serve until a successor takes office.
- †S8.52. The terms of the officers shall begin on the first day of **[(name of month)]** [the **(ordinal number)** month] following election or, in special circumstances, at a time designated by the Synod Council.
- †S8.53. Each officer shall be a voting member in a congregation **or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community** of this synod, except that the bishop need not be a member of a congregation of this synod at the time of election.

Chapter 10.
SYNOD COUNCIL

- †S10.01. The Synod Council, consisting of the four officers of the synod, **and** 10 to 24 other members, **and** at least one **young adult youth** ~~and~~ **with a goal of** at least one **young adult youth**, shall be elected by the Synod Assembly.
- a. Each person elected to the Synod Council shall be a voting member of a congregation **or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community** of this synod, with the exception of ministers on a roster of this synod who reside outside the territory of this synod. The process for election and the term of office when not otherwise provided shall be specified in the bylaws. A member of the Church Council of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, unless otherwise elected as a voting member of the Synod Council, may serve as an advisory member of the Synod Council with voice but not vote.

Chapter 11.
COMMITTEES
(names of other organizational units)

- †S11.11. This synod shall in its bylaws or by continuing resolution establish a process to ensure that the members of its committees and other organizational units will be persons possessing the necessary knowledge and competence to be effective members of such units, and to meet the requirements of †S6.04. With the exception of ministers on the rosters of this synod who reside outside the territory of this synod, each member of a committee of this synod, or any other organizational unit created by this synod, shall be a voting member of a congregation **or a confirmed member of a synod-authorized worshiping community** of this synod.

Chapter 13.
CONGREGATIONS

- †S13.01. Each congregation, except those certified as congregations of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America by the uniting churches, prior to being listed in the roster of congregations of this synod, shall adopt the *Model Constitution for Congregations* or one acceptable to this synod that is not in contradiction to the constitution and bylaws of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
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- c. **Recognition and reception.** Recognition and reception **of additional congregations** into this church ~~of transferring or independent congregations by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is based upon the judgment of the synod that the congregations satisfy the criteria of 9.21. and 9.25. is based on the judgment of the synod and action by the synod through the Synod Council and Synod Assembly.~~ The synod bishop shall provide for prompt reporting of such additions to the secretary of this church for addition to the roster of congregations.
- 1) **Recognition and reception of congregations newly formed by this church is accomplished by action of the Synod Council.**
 - 2) **Recognition and reception of transferring or independent congregations is accomplished by the action of the Synod Assembly upon the recommendation of the Synod Council.**
 - a. **If a congregation is a member of another church body, the leadership of the congregation first should consult with the appropriate authorities of that church body before taking action**

- to leave its current church body. After such consultation, leaders of the congregation should contact the synod bishop or synod staff in this church where the congregation is located.
- b. The synod bishop or synod staff where the transferring or independent congregation is located shall confer with the congregation to assure its understanding and acceptance of commitment to and affiliation with the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Chapter 14.
ROSTERED MINISTERS

- †S14.12. Consistent with the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America,
- a. Every minister of Word and Sacrament shall:
-
- 8) speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, proclaiming God's love for the world, advocating dignity, justice, and equity for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, caring for the marginalized, and embracing and welcoming racially and ethnically diverse populations.
- †S14.18. The provisions for termination of the mutual relationship between a minister of Word and Sacrament and a congregation shall be as follows:
-
- d. In the case of alleged local difficulties that imperil the effective functioning of the congregation under paragraph a.3) above, the bishop's committee shall endeavor to hear from all concerned persons, after which the bishop together with the committee shall present their recommendations first to the pastor and then to the congregation. In the bishop's sole discretion, the bishop's committee may also present, as may be appropriate, either a report or report summary to the pastor and to the congregation together with the recommendations. The recommendations of the bishop's committee must address whether the pastor's call should come to an end and, if so, may suggest appropriate severance arrangements. The committee may also propose other actions that should be undertaken by the congregation and by the pastor, if appropriate. If the pastor and congregation agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action need be taken by the synod.
- †S14.32. Consistent with the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, every minister of Word and Service shall:
-
- c. Speak publicly to the world in solidarity with the poor and oppressed, proclaiming God's love for the world, advocating dignity, justice, and equity for all people, working for peace and reconciliation among the nations, caring for the marginalized, and embracing and welcoming racially and ethnically diverse populations;

Chapter 17.
CONSULTATION AND ADJUDICATION

- †S17.02. The synod bishop and the Executive Committee of the Synod Council shall receive expressions of concern from rostered ministers of this church, congregations, and organizations within this synod; provide a forum in which the parties concerned can seek to work out matters causing distress or conflict; and make appropriate recommendations for their resolution. When a concern relates directly to the synod bishop, the synod vice president will lead the Executive Committee's efforts at resolving the matter. When the matter at issue cannot be resolved in this manner, applicable procedures for investigation, decision, appeal, and adjudication shall be followed. Allegations or charges that could lead to the discipline of a rostered minister of this church shall not be addressed by the Executive Committee but shall be resolved through the disciplinary process set forth in the *Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America*.

Chapter 18.
AMENDMENTS, BYLAWS, AND CONTINUING RESOLUTIONS

- †S18.12. Whenever the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America officially informs this synod that the Churchwide Assembly has amended any non-required provision of the Constitution for Synods, this constitution may be amended to reflect any such amendment by a majority vote at any subsequent meeting of the Synod Assembly without presentation at a prior Synod Assembly. An amendment that is identical to a provision of the *Constitution for Synods* shall be deemed to have been ratified upon its adoption by this synod. The Church Council, through the secretary of this church, shall be given prompt notification of its adoption.
- †S18.13. Other amendments to this constitution may be adopted by this synod through either of the following procedures:
- Introduced with the support of at least _____ voting members and having been approved by a two-thirds vote of the voting members present and voting at a regular meeting of the Synod Assembly, an amendment may be adopted-ratified unchanged by a two-thirds vote at the next regular meeting of the Synod Assembly.

The third ballot shall be limited to the seven persons ~~(plus ties)~~ who receive the greatest number of legal votes (including ties in the final qualifying position) on the second ballot, and two-thirds of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. The fourth ballot shall be limited to the three persons ~~(plus ties)~~ who receive the greatest number of legal votes (including ties in the final qualifying position) on the third ballot, and 60 percent of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. On subsequent ballots a majority of the legal votes cast shall be necessary for election. These ballots shall be limited to the two persons ~~(plus ties)~~ who receive the greatest number of legal votes (including ties in the final qualifying position) on the previous ballot.

Chapter 10. SYNOD COUNCIL

S10.05. ~~No e~~lected members of the Synod Council shall not receive compensation solely for ~~such their~~ service as council members.

~~S10.06.~~ No person related to a synod staff member shall be eligible for nomination to or membership on the Synod Council [or the following synod committees: _____]. 2025 REPORT OF THE FISCAL MANAGEMENT, ADMINISTRATION, AND PROPERTY COMMITTEE (FMAP)

NJ Synod's Constitution provides a guiding principle for the mission of FMAP: *"Since the congregations, synods, and churchwide organization are interdependent expressions that share in God's mission, all share in the responsibility to develop, implement, and strengthen the financial support of the whole church. The gifts and offerings of the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are given to support all parts of this church, the unity in this church should be evidenced in determining each part's share of the gifts and offerings."*

The core values of our individual members, congregations, the NJ Synod, the ELCA and the church worldwide are dependent on the physical and financial resources necessary to carry out our missions and ministries. FMAP's responsibility as a committee reporting directly to the NJ Synod Council is to carefully monitor and manage our financial resources and assets to help optimize the success of the Synod's and its individual congregations' ministries while adhering to the values to which we all ascribe.

A critical function of the FMAP Committee each year is to develop and recommend a spending plan for the upcoming fiscal year. On March 6, 2025 the committee met to discuss and approve an initial 2027 spending plan to be submitted to Synod Council and ultimately to be presented at Synod Assembly for approval. Jim Harris, Treasurer (Faith, Hillsborough), with input from Synod staff, was instrumental in developing the initial plan. Recent history over the last several years indicates that the spending plans recommended by the FMAP Committee have accurately forecasted the financial results and needs of the individual ministries and needs of the Synod.

A total of 4 FMAP regular quarterly meetings were also held via Zoom in 2025 (March 6, May 22, September 4 and November 20) to monitor and manage financial and property issues throughout the year. *The specific actions undertaken by FMAP and approved by Synod Council are detailed in the consolidated minutes of the NJ Synod Council meetings found in the Bulletin of Reports.*

The duties of the committee extend beyond the fiscal responsibility of monitoring and managing the finances and creating a spending plan for the following year. In fact, some of the most important tasks of the committee are working with individual congregations in need of support. Examples include:

- Manage the Transformational Ministry Loan program to help congregations meet needs for improvements to their facilities and grow their ministries (managed by Jill Weidner, Good Shepherd, Somerville). During 2025, loans were approved to Holy Counselor Lutheran in Sussex and Faith Lutheran in Hillsborough.
- Provide consultation for physical improvements required by individual congregations that need assistance. Glenn Rentschler, St. Paul, East Windsor is Property Director who manages the North and South Property Managers. Congregations are generally responsible for cost of improvements.
- Manage the properties of congregations that have closed and facilitate their sale. Manage the distribution of sale proceeds according to the wishes of congregations. Jim Harris, Synod Treasurer, manages the sale of church buildings in addition to his financial management responsibilities.

A significant number of volunteer and staff hours are required for the financial management of the NJ Synod and the above related tasks. Much gratitude is due to the committee members and the synod staff who, through the work of the FMAP committee, serve and support our Synod through the faithful management of the synod's finances and property matters (see list of Committee members below). We especially want to acknowledge Lois

Parrett (Financial Accounting & Office Manager) who works closely with our Treasurer, and we welcome our new Bishop, The Rev. Dr. Christa Compton for her leadership and insights.

Report of the New Jersey Synod Fund for Mission

The New Jersey Synod Fund for Mission is an endowment fund providing resources for mission-related projects of the New Jersey Synod that might otherwise go unmet. Begun with proceeds from the sale of former LCA church properties, it continues gratefully to receive and faithfully to invest funds granted to it from bequests to the Synod. Grants are made, ranging from 3% to 6% of the corpus annually (4.6% in 2025). The Fund's Management Committee receives and evaluates proposals from Synod program units, mission clusters, congregations, officers and Synod Council and makes recommendations to the Synod Council for funding. Special categories in the fund are reserved for Music Grants in support of the development of church musicians and for Handicap Accessibility.

These criteria guide us: (proposals need not meet every criterion):

1. The proposed program shall be one that could not normally be funded by the operating budget of the Synod or ELCA Churchwide Ministries, or by the agency for whom the grant is sought. (Frequently the committee responds to the need represented by finding other appropriate funding sources.) One grant application per ministry will be considered annually. In support of our core value of interdependence, applicants are expected to share some mission support during the year.
2. Preference is given for:
 - initiating new mission ventures: providing seed money and/or leveraging other funds for mission.
 - projects having a direct relationship to the urban character of the Synod.
 - projects that are inclusive with regard to color, language, ages, and sex of persons.
 - projects that address the needs of the disadvantaged, especially the poor, mentally and physically challenged, and the powerless.
 - projects that enable the Synod to develop new ministries to meet needs occasioned by societal change.

Grants approved for 2025/2026 projects totaled \$160,000 and were in support of applications for Synod Council Mission Initiatives, Advocacy/Social Justice, Discipleship and Evangelism, Hunger Ministries/Outreach, Music Ministry, Property/Renovation/Technology Upgrades and Youth/Family Ministry-Related Applications.

Management Committee members can assist those interested in preparing a grant application. The submission deadline is September 30th. Payment is made following Synod Council approval. Grant recipients are requested to evaluate their respective projects for report to the Fund for Mission Management Committee by June 1 of the year following receipt of the funds.

Thanks to all the members of the Management Committee for their wise guidance in the stewardship of this Fund. We are indebted to Bishop Christa Compton for her leadership, Treasurer James Harris for his invaluable work and report of it, and to LuAnn Barnes, Administrative Assistant and Confidential Secretary to the Bishop for her excellent assistance in preparing our minutes and correspondence!

Cross Roads 2025 Annual Report to the New Jersey Synod of the ELCA

OVERVIEW: Cross Roads Camp and Retreat Center is a ministry of the New Jersey Lutheran Synod and the Episcopal Diocese of Newark. It is, in essence, *your* camp, though its hospitality extends beyond the Synod and the Diocese, welcoming campers and retreatants of all ages and from diverse communities, including church and unchurched. We are celebrating our 25th anniversary this year and are thrilled to celebrate 25 years of helping people of all ages grow deeper in their faith and broader in their understanding of what it means to be beloved of God.

PROGRAM: Cross Roads' programming is one of its greatest strengths. There are summer camps for children and youth of all ages, day camps, and family camps. All of the camps encourage exploring faith and relationship with God in ways that are fun and exciting and meaningful. There are retreats, some offered by Cross Roads, such as the Women's Retreat and the Confirmation Retreats, and others hosted but the programming is done by the guest congregation or group. There are events, such as the monthly Wednesdays Away, a themed day of spiritual renewal for anyone who's interested, and The Shape of Leadership, a leadership development program for clergy. For parishes that need some support with children and youth formation, there's FaithSource, a collaboration with Luther Crest, an ELCA camp in Minnesota.

FISCAL MANAGEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT: As is true with many parishes and other organizations we rely heavily on your generosity to fund our ministries. We are grateful to all who provide financial support, including the gifts we receive from the New Jersey Synod and the Diocese, from the Bishops' offices, parishes and congregations, and the members of those parishes and congregations. We rely heavily on grants and the fundraising events organized by our Development council. It is this combination of sources and the prudent fiscal management of our Executive Director, Anthony Briggs, and his staff that enables us to keep tuition and fees affordable, scholarships available, and our aging building and grounds in good shape. We were excited to complete renovation of one of our shower houses in time for the 2025 camp season, though perhaps not as excited as the campers were to use it!

STAFF: The staff, under Anthony's leadership, is key to the success of the ministry. There is a small year-round staff and a larger summer staff, all of whom are passionate about Cross Roads' mission and share their love of God in all that they do. A major focus of Anthony's leadership is to develop the leaders of the future, both for Cross Roads and the wider Church. One of our goals for 2026 is to find ways to increase the pay scale so that we can continue to attract the same level of staff excellence into the future.

BOARD: The Board meets regularly, with a combination of in-person and online meetings. In addition to the full Board meetings, a number of standing and ad hoc committees meet to work on specific program areas and projects. We continue to be challenged in identifying new Board members and would appreciate your prayers and willingness to serve, if you feel called to this ministry.

Cross Roads is YOUR camp. We invite you to visit the campus and the website: crossroadsretreat.com for more information about how a deep and abiding faith in God is lived in this ministry. And as always, we are grateful for your support in prayer, in service, and in faithful giving.

Dear Friends in Christ,

Grace to you and peace as you meet in synod assembly. I write to you with greetings from my Candidacy Team Colleagues on Churchwide Staff and my home synod of New Jersey.

The ministry of Candidacy is one of accompanying, evaluating, and assessing the readiness of people who discern a call to pastoral or diaconal ministry. Each synod has a committee that does this confidential and prayerful work on behalf of the whole church. The committee includes clergy and lay members, a seminary representative, and synod staff or Bishop. Your synod has a committee that has met in the past year to do this work. You can read more about their ministry elsewhere in this bulletin of reports. I have the honor of working with these committees in the northeast and mid-Atlantic as they listen to candidates, ask questions, and consider how God is calling people to serve.

In 2022, a Candidacy Leadership Development Working Group (CLDWG) was convened to start reenvisioning candidacy ministry in the ELCA. Since my report to you a year ago, the work of this group has changed. After years of surveys, planning, and dreaming, the work has shifted from the CLDWG to churchwide staff to begin the rollout of a launch for a new candidacy process. Of the 65 synods in the ELCA, 10 are “candidacy launch synods” who will be working with applicants and candidates in these next few years under a newly proposed candidacy process. These launch synods will also provide valuable feedback so that a new candidacy process can be finalized for the whole church.

Main elements of this new candidacy process include:

-  Accompanier with candidates throughout the process
-  Discernment as a more intentional and robust time prior to meeting for an Entrance Interview
-  Annual Reviews with candidates instead of an Endorsement
-  Competency based emphasis for meeting milestones throughout candidacy
-  Continuing to honor both MDiv and Certificate pathways for candidates

Synods that are not “candidacy launch synods” will continue with the current candidacy process until 2028 or 2029 when we anticipate a rollout of the new candidacy process across the ELCA.

While we continue in the ministry of accompanying and assessing potential deacons or pastors in the ELCA, we appreciate your prayers. The church needs leaders who are equipped, called, and prepared to serve the church. If *you* are sensing a call to serve as a deacon or pastor in the ELCA, please contact your synod staff person for candidacy for further conversation.

The Church Property Resource Hub (CPRH) was created **in response to questions and needs voiced by synods and congregations** regarding the use, management and support of church-held property. Our congregations find themselves with buildings and land that no longer fit their need for programming or their capacity to manage them. This has spurred urgent conversations at local and synod levels about the future of church property. There was no centralized hub collecting the information and wisdom congregations need to **faithfully steward buildings and land** for both congregational vitality and mission impact. The ELCA churchwide organization is addressing this need by equipping congregation and synod leaders with the expertise that will empower congregations to continue to steward their buildings and land as a witness to the gospel through the Church Property Resource Hub.

The Church Property Resource Hub is ...

... an online platform that connects congregations and synod leaders to information, organizations and guidance on effective, faith-driven management of church property. It includes how-to lessons for the many aspects of property stewardship, stories of congregations that have found creative solutions to property challenges, and a network of professionals who can answer questions and partner with congregations and synods.

The resource hub is **built for synod and local church leaders, to help them navigate the challenges and opportunities that buildings and land represent.** The hub offers advice and experience for churches in a variety of contexts across the United States, from urban centers to suburban areas to rural and small-town communities. The Church Property Resource Hub is a growing initiative that will be completed by 2028, though the first, most basic version was launched in August 2025.

The Church Property Resource Hub is NOT ...

... an attempt by the churchwide organization to take control of congregations' property. Local churches hold the title and deed to their property; their right to make independent decisions about the use, management and future of their property is codified in the ELCA constitution and churches' individual constitutions.

... an attempt by the churchwide organization to bypass synods' relationships with their congregations. The resource hub is being built **in collaboration with synod leaders** and equips them to **assist and guide congregations** that approach the synod with ideas, questions or concerns about property stewardship.

Who leads the Church Property Resource Hub?

The Church Property Resource Hub is led by the **Rev. Sarah Jones** (program director), **Deacon Sarah Kretschmann** (digital communications manager) and the **Rev. Tim Brown** (director of congregational stewardship). This team is reaching out across the ELCA, our sibling denominations and the many organizations and businesses that focus on church property, to collect, curate and disseminate information that synods and congregations need. ELCA Federal Credit Union Faithful financial services for ELCA members and ministries



The ELCA Federal Credit Union (ELCA FCU) provides a full range of financial products and services to members, congregations and ministries of the ELCA. **As the first of the ELCA's financial ministries to offer loans to individuals**, the Credit Union offers savings and checking accounts, CDs, loans and lines of credit, credit cards, home mortgage loans for purchases or refinances, as well as home equity loans and lines of credit.

The ELCA FCU serves ministries through federally insured deposit accounts, a flexible corporate credit card program, auto loans and unsecured ministry loans up to \$100,000 to support smaller projects such as building repairs and purchases. In addition, the Workplace Banking program allows ministry organizations and congregations to offer ELCA FCU Credit Union products and services, along with other exclusive perks, to their employees.

A new cohort joined the ELCA's Resourceful Servants program, **designed to improve financial wellness and assist rostered leaders in building emergency savings funds**. Through this matching program, ELCA rostered leaders make ongoing deposits to their Credit Union emergency savings accounts. The Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA matches those deposits up to an established amount. Together, more **than 700 rostered ministers** have been served, collectively depositing more than \$1 million in emergency savings.

A **strong online presence** means members have access to funds with an ELCA Federal Credit Union Mastercard Debit Card at more than 30,000 surcharge-free ATMs. The ELCA FCU also offers account-to-account (A2A) transfers, person-to-person (P2P) payments (similar to Venmo and Zelle), remote deposit, bill pay and more.

Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey 2025 Report New Jersey Synod 38th Assembly

LSMNJ's diverse programs served more than 2,400 individuals through senior living, affordable housing, hospice, and home care. The organization is compelled by grace to serve those who hurt, who are in need, and who have limited choices.

ORGANIZATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey assists people of all ages, backgrounds, and faiths. The organization cares for some of the most disadvantaged, indigent families and seniors, as well as seniors in need of healthcare, home care, and hospice care services. Throughout 2025, LSMNJ continued its commitment to helping those with immediate needs while also keeping a strategic eye on the future through construction projects, program advancement, and employee engagement.

Crane's Mill

- ❖ Crane's Mill maintained a steady bond rating, as reported by Fitch, solidifying its financial stability and reliability.
- ❖ Crane's Mill was distinguished by Newsweek as one of America's Best Continuing Care Retirement Communities of 2025.

Lutheran Senior LIFE

- ❖ Lutheran Senior LIFE, already well established in Jersey City and serving Hudson County, is preparing to serve Union County residents through its new Programs for the All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE) site in Plainfield. The construction phase of the project is complete, and we look forward to opening in May 2026.
- ❖ Lutheran Senior LIFE at Jersey City continues to provide all services at its day center. In addition, services continue to be provided to participants in their homes, if they cannot attend the center due to their chronic medical conditions. The center continues to provide breakfast, lunch and frozen meals for our participants.
- ❖ Pastor Glenn, the LIFE Chaplain, continues to play a vital role by providing spiritual support at the center and by visiting homes and communicating through video chat.
- ❖ Lutheran Senior LIFE at Jersey City partnered with the Jersey City Division of Aging in creating and completing an "Aging in Place" Survey aimed at improving accessibility, affordability, and comfortability for seniors within Jersey City. This survey will be translated into data which will be presented to the City Council.
- ❖ Lutheran Senior LIFE at Jersey City in collaboration with the Jersey City Division of Housing donated undergarments to the division's annual back-to-school drive, in addition to school materials.

Journey Hospice

- ❖ Journey Hospice expanded its volunteer program across all locations, enhancing companionship, respite, and patient support.
- ❖ Journey Hospice strengthened community engagement through initiatives such as Veterans Café, National Healthcare Decisions Day, and Senior Center presentations.
- ❖ Journey Hospice offers counseling services by licensed therapists, guided by physician and Interdisciplinary Team (IDT) recommendations, to support patients, families, and

- caregivers through end-of-life challenges. In adherence to the new regulatory standards, qualified counseling professionals were hired and onboarded.
- ❖ In northern New Jersey, in-services on "navigating the healthcare maze" in senior centers were conducted.
 - ❖ Bereavement Support Groups have been offered in multiple areas as well as virtually by our Hospice Chaplains.
 - ❖ The **LSMNJ Foundation** reported 23 churches throughout the state and 5 affiliated church groups were supportive partners in 2025.
 - ❖ The ELCA's grant of \$75,000 came to a conclusion in 2025 helping to construct the Lutheran Senior LIFE facility serving Union County. This is a Program for the All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly.
 - ❖ LSMNJ spearheaded the Easter Dinner Drive in partnership with three congregations, collecting \$1,394 in donations to benefit residents and families in affordable housing. In addition, St. Michael's Lutheran Church in Cherry Hill provided \$900 to ensure our families in Camden enjoyed a Thanksgiving Feast.
 - ❖ LSMNJ completed the management services agreement with **SpiriTrust Lutheran**, in which LSMNJ assumed management oversight of SpiriTrust Lutheran, allowing it to continue its work in Central Pennsylvania.
 - ❖ The Great Place to Work Institute and its senior care partner, Activated Insights, have again for the sixth year in a row honored Lutheran Social Ministries of NJ with a certification as a Great Place to Work.
 - ❖ LSMNJ was named a Certified Age-Friendly Employer by the Age-Friendly Institute. This accolade holds a special place in our hearts as it is the nation's only certification program dedicated to identifying organizations that are genuinely committed to being exemplary workplaces for employees aged 50 and above. Being acknowledged in this way reinforces our ongoing dedication to fostering an inclusive and supportive environment for all our team members, regardless of age.

PEOPLE SERVED IN 2025

LSMNJ served 2,480 people and outreached to 6,826 individuals as part of the many programs and services it provides across the state. The lives of New Jersey residents were improved through community services such as; Immigration Legal Services – 330 served, Journey Hospice – 475 served, and SpiriCare at Home – 75 served. 1,020 qualified NJ residents lived in LSMNJ Affordable Housing properties; 471 seniors received residential and health services through Senior Healthcare and Retirement Living programs; and 9 adults with mental health needs lived in specialized long-term housing. Through the gracious efforts of 101 individual volunteers and 89 groups, 5,838 volunteer hours were provided in support of LSMNJ's mission.

This has been an exciting year! The NJ Coalition of Religious Leaders has successfully merged with the Lutheran Advocacy Office. In July, I officially became the first Executive Director of the NJ Coalition of Religious Leaders (NJCLR).

We have had successes and challenges, as to be expected, in this first year.

Successes:

- We received our 501(c)3 designation as a new organization in the State of NJ
- We drafted and adopted the By-laws for the organization
- We elected the first Board of Directors and Elected officers
- We have a strong Board that is dedicated to each other and this organization
- The Coalition's committees are staffed and beginning their work
- We successfully merged data from the Lutheran Episcopal Advocacy Ministry with the NJ Coalition of Religious Leaders. We are now building our Action Network.
- Every member of the Coalition was contacted by phone during the fall and invited to the General Meeting in December
- We hosted a General Meeting that focused on Care of Creation. The Rev Dr. Laurel Kearns was the keynote speaker, and leading advocates from NJ spoke on specific issues facing our state
- We met with the new Faith Action Center Director and the Lieutenant Governor to build a strong working relationship.
- We organized an advocacy campaign partnering with Green Faith to get the Climate Super Fund bill moving through the legislature
- And we advocated for four other bills to get to the Governor's Desk during the Lame Duck Session focusing on immigration protections
- We launched the "Yes In God's Back Yard" legislation for Religious and Educational Institutions to use their land and property for Affordable Housing. We participated in a press conference and have gotten a strong champion in the Senate to be the sponsor of the legislation
- We are partnering with the Institute for Social Justice to launch a "Souls to the Polls" campaign here in NJ to support voter turnout
- We are building advocacy campaigns to increase TANF funding and raise the minimum benefit level for SNAP recipients. We are also working with the Governor's office to put funding into the 2027 budget that would permanently fund a program to support women with feminine hygiene products and diapers

Challenges:

- We realized that many of our members had personal relationships with the former Coordinator of the Coalition (he is now deceased), so we need to rebuild these connections
- The Chair of the Board decided to run for Governor as a write-in candidate. The Board asked him to step away from his role while he was running for office
- The Vice Chair of the Board passed away after an illness in March
- The Treasurer received significantly more responsibility at his current position because of the new Pope's election, so he asked to be replaced. We have brought a new treasurer into the position and are working through the transition
- Our website is being rebuilt and this is a considerable effort for the organization

Despite these issues, we continue to move forward in faith, with a clear commitment to the importance and necessity of the Coalition's Interfaith work in New Jersey.

Policy Priorities- 2026

“Yes in God’s Backyard”

[Senate Bill 1836](#): The "Yes in God's Backyard" (YIGBY) act in New Jersey, sponsored by State Senator Troy Singleton, is legislation designed to allow faith-based organizations and non-profits to convert underutilized land into affordable housing. The proposal aims to ease zoning restrictions and expedite approvals to address the state's housing crisis, typically requiring at least 20% of units to be affordable.

Minimum benefit increases for TANF and SNAP

TANF benefits in New Jersey have fallen behind inflation, with a maximum monthly cash payment for a family of three at \$559 as of early 2026. We are advocating for this benefit to be increased. To learn more [click here](#).

New Jersey provides a minimum monthly SNAP benefit of \$95 for all eligible households, even while food prices continue to rise. Because of the federal HR1 decision, NJ has been required to implement strict work requirements, pay more of the administrative costs for SNAP and make it necessary for recipients to reapply for benefits. This life supporting program must be strengthened!

The state sponsored a pilot project in 2025 to provide a small amount of assistance to women for hygiene products and diapers (\$30 a month for diapers and \$10 a month for hygiene products). The pilot project was a huge success, we are advocating that this program be implemented statewide, and funding be made permanent.

Community reinvestment act

[A5957/S4694](#)- We are working with NJ Citizen Action to move the state toward establishing a stricter state-level Community Reinvestment Act (CRA) via Bill A5957/S4694, targeting lending gaps in low- and moderate-income (LMI) communities. This proposed law would expand oversight to nonbank lenders, credit unions, and online institutions, requiring them to meet the needs of persons with low and moderate incomes. It would require all lending institutions to reinvest back into underserved communities with affordable housing and small business loans.

Voting Rights

[S282/A1715](#), The “John R. Lewis Voter Empowerment Act of New Jersey” this legislation reinforces the need for voter protections by requiring that all election-related statutes, rules, and regulations favor voter participation. It also addresses critical issues such as voter suppression, intimidation and violence, and the right to pursue legal action against discrimination. Among other issues, this bill empowers voters who may feel disenfranchised and makes sure their ballots are cast and counted without unnecessary obstacles.

Souls to the Poles

We are partnering with the Institute for Social Justice to promote voting and turnout in the next election.

Climate Justice

[A3735/S3545](#)/ “Polluters Pay to Make New Jersey More Affordable Act,” is the primary legislation to push in NJ to hold large fossil fuel companies financially responsible for climate change adaptation, targeting \$50 billion in payments from major polluters to fund infrastructure projects and reduce costs for residents.

MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR: A Homecoming for Prisoners of Hope

Return to your fortress, you prisoners of hope; even now I announce that I will restore twice as much to you.

Zechariah 9:12

Dear friends of Seafarers International House (SIH):

In February 2024, a report released by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services found that refugees and asylees have generated tens of billions of dollars more in local, state, and federal tax revenues over the last 15 years than they have cost in direct government services — ultimately representing a net fiscal gain at all levels of government. (See text box for details.)*

And yet, throughout 2025 and especially today, many refugees and asylum seekers are being threatened with deportation and imprisonment. As SIH board member Ralie Deffenbaugh reminds us, in September 2025, the Council of Churches in Namibia convened an event titled “we are prisoners of hope,” which drew parallels between Namibia’s historical struggle for liberation and the current plight of refugees and asylum seekers. The phrase is based on Zechariah 9:12 and has historically been used by leaders like Bishop Zephania Kameeta and Archbishop Desmond Tutu. What a powerful connotation.

Here at SIH, we have been charting a course toward a grand Homecoming — a return to a new home through the purchase of a property in downtown Manhattan. Just a stone’s throw from our original site in 1873, this new space will become a true home away from

home for asylum seekers and seafarers, many of whom are “prisoners of hope.” Within these walls, our guests will find safety, welcome, and the assurance that they have reached a secure harbor.

During 2026, we will begin renovating this right-sized mission building, creating 16 guest rooms and community space to accommodate both small asylum-seeking families and individuals, as well as visiting seafarers. With these improvements underway, we are looking ahead to opening our doors in early 2027, ready to offer refuge and rest to all who arrive.

Parallel, we will be launching a comprehensive campaign to pay for the renovations, reduce the burden of a loan for the new building, and strengthen our services to seafarers and asylum seekers. We will keep you posted in the months to come.

In April 2025, we had a most successful Setting the Course reception thanks to the generosity of our honorees Susan Winfree, Willie Barrere, and notably Robert Sappio, - and their friends. The boost in event support enabled us to expand our services through a partnership with the Houston International Seafarers Center with our port chaplain Pastor Tammy Sharp in that busy port in the Lone Star State.

Thus, we continued a robust port mission in now six ports with nine port chaplains and ship visitors, and a fleet of six vans that we use to visit ships and to transport seafarers. In the summer and fall, volunteers from the Propeller Club, congregations, board members,

and individuals helped us assemble satchels. These efforts paid off with 3,405 Christmas-at-Sea satchels delivered to seafarers connecting donors with seafaring “prisoners of hope” who experienced the joy of Christmas.

In 2025, we served 19,519 people including 19 asylum seekers we welcomed providing them with shelter, food, and social work assistance; a far cry from the 33 and 49 in 2024 and 2023 respectively because asylum seekers are fearful of coming out of the shadows. Obviously, the curtailment on asylum seekers has had its effect.

With these positive 2025 highlights in mind, perhaps we are all “prisoners of hope” in that as we are bound together in despair, we are also bound together in hope that will not leave us imprisoned.

“For I know the plans I have for you” declares the Lord, “plans to prosper you and not harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.”

* From 2005 to 2019, refugees and asylees paid a total of \$123.8 billion more in taxes than they cost in government services, for a net fiscal gain of \$31.5 billion to the federal government and \$92.3 billion to state and local governments combined. Refugees and asylees paid an estimated \$363 billion to the federal government through payroll, income, and excise taxes, and \$218 billion to state and local governments through income, sales, and property taxes. Even when factoring in their spouses and children under 18, many of whom are U.S. citizens, refugees and asylees still provided a net fiscal gain, costing \$723.4 billion in government services yet paying \$739.4 billion in tax revenue, for a net gain of \$16 billion.

2025 Program Impact

19,519 immigrants and seafarers directly benefited from SIH's services (up from 19,066)

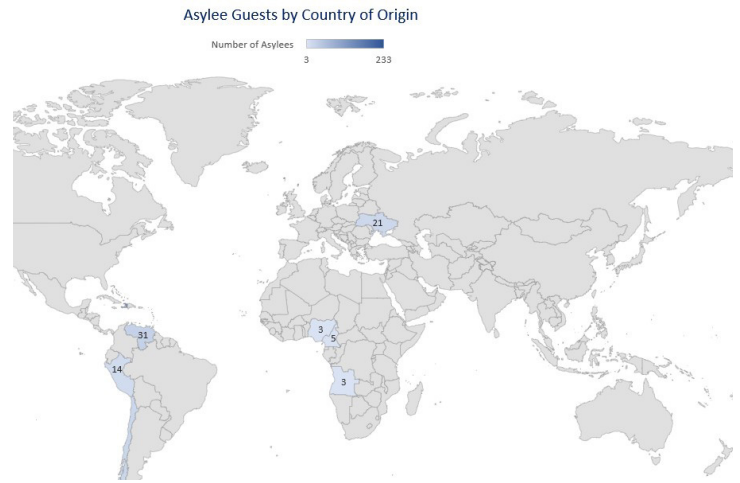
2,351 lodging nights (up from 2,225) provided to 139 seafarers in Manhattan.

14,078 seafarers were visited and counseled (up from 13,556) on 1,347 vessels, receiving essentials they requested.

1,878 seafarers were transported to a mall or medical facilities.

3,405 seafarers, regardless of faith, received Christmas-at-Sea satchels filled with warm clothing and holiday greetings to spread joy beyond borders and oceans.


19 asylum seekers received free lodging for a total of 1,328 nights. They hailed from Angola, Cameroon, Chile, Cuba (3), Haiti (5), Nigeria, Peru, Ukraine, and Venezuela (5). See map below.



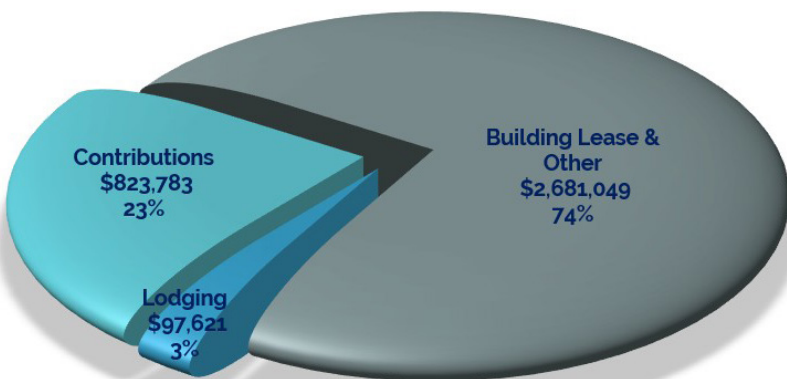
2025 FINANCIAL REPORT

In accordance with our 2024 - 2028 strategic plan, operating gains continued to help build reserves for the purchase of the new right-sized mission headquarters (\$1M). These gains also allow for capital repairs on the guesthouse (\$324,806), which is leased to Breaking Ground, a NYC-based non-profit which provides transitional housing to the community.

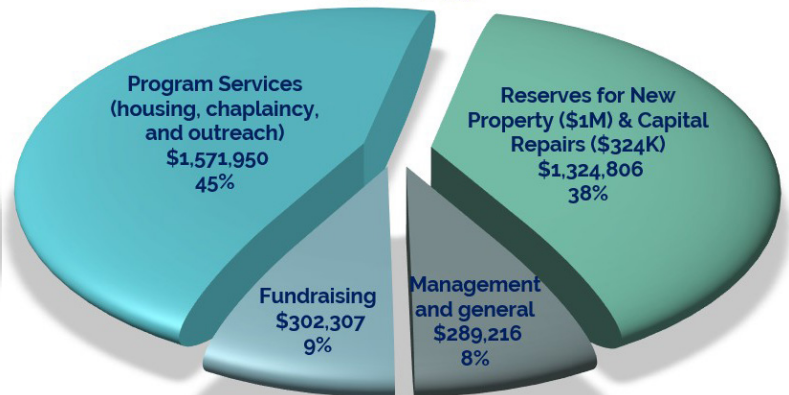
Lease revenue needs to be augmented by donations to support our services and the purchase and renovation of our new home starting in 2026. Program services and reserves accounted for 83% of expenses with only 17% spent on management and fundraising. These figures reflect unaudited revenue and expenses and are subject to change.
