# FUN FACTS ABOUT SPIRITUALITY, SOCIAL NETWORKS, AND GENEROSITY

The following information comes from Putnam and Campbell (2010) *American Grace: How Religion Divides and Unites Us* and from Wuthnot (1999) *Arts and Religion Survey.* Priceton University Department of Sociology.

#### NETWORKS MAKE RELIGIOUS AMERICANS MORE GENEROUS IN THEIR GIVING?

- People with religiously-based social connections are two or three times more likely to be civically
  engaged and generous than people with few such ties, regardless of how devout and observant
  they may be.
- Religiously-based social networks lead people not just inward to the church but outward to the wider secular community.
- People in religious networks behave more generously in part because they are asked more often by the people who are part of their religious social network.

### RELIGIOUS UPBRINGING HAS A POSITIVE EFFECT ON GIVING

- Having a special Bible as a child increases giving to one's congregation as an adult on average by \$221.
- Having a favorite religious picture or object as a child increases giving by \$280.

### PERSONAL DEVOTIONAL PRACTICES AS AN ADULT MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN GIVING

- Reading the Bible every day increases giving by \$545.
- Praying every day increases giving by \$358.
- Meditating every day raises giving by \$211.

### BEING LINKED TO PEOPLE INCREASES GIVING: REGARDING SPIRITUALITY AS PERSONAL AND PRIVATE REDUCES IT.

- Doing volunteer work increases giving by \$528.
- Each additional friend one has in a congregation increases giving by \$118.
- Saying that one's spirituality does not depend on being involved in a religious organization REDUCES giving by \$464.

### **MISSION SUPPORT TRENDING NOW!**

At the close of October, our Mission Support income in the New Jersey Synod is significantly behind our giving pattern from last year and well off-pace from our 2017 budget. Current Mission Support gifts are \$97,750 behind our giving for the same period last year. We project that without strong year-end giving, we may miss our budgeted income goal by about \$179,000. Steps have already been taken to adapt our spending considering these shortfalls; adjustments in central office staff have been instituted, and one Assistant to the Bishop position has been eliminated.
