Book recommendations:

One volume commentary (I have the New Interpreters). There are also niche commentaries like Queer Bible and Women's. I have heard that there will be one compiled and edited by African Descent scholars, but I don't think it has been released yet.

A Bible Dictionary is good. I have the Harper Collins, which was edited by my favorite NT professor, Mark Allan Powell. I also recommend his Intro to the New Testament.

Martin Luther's Christmas and Easter books edited by Roland H. Bainton are helpful for those times of the year.

Children's Books from Augsburg Fortress are great, because they usually include the gospel for you. If you want to use Dr. Seuss or something else like the Kissing Hand or Rock Soup (great books!!!), you probably need to say something after that ties in the gospel.
